<<Course Objectives>>

This semester, students will become fluent in speaking and listening to the Japanese language contents covered in the lessons 8 through 12 of the textbook. Mastery of 56 new kanji. Students will demonstrate more natural speech patterns by using casual speech, expressing opinions, comparing items and using qualifying nouns. With mastery of Genki I textbook, students are qualified for N5 of JLPT exam by end of semester.

<<Course Expectations>>

Students will demonstrate active engaged attitude towards learning. Students are encouraged to bring pocket dictionaries or cell phones to look up words. Sleeping in class also counts as unexcused absence. This is a bilingual environment; students may use English but must also speak Japanese as much as they can. Even if grammar is wrong, it is preferable to speak Japanese over English. Speak Japanese the way you like to speak. Fridays will be designated conversation days when students must only speak Japanese. Any display of rudeness or intolerance will call for disciplinary action. All opinions and comments of every different caliber and standard are respected and respectfully responded to. When sensei or your classmate is speaking, everybody must be silent.

 25% Homework— Doing homework consistently is of the essence for any world language course. Homework is the only time you spend outside of class where your mind becomes Japanese. **THREE of your lowest homework scores will be dropped from final grade.** Missed homework is a zero (you came to class but forgot homework).

Absent policy: When you come back to class, you must

- 2) Quizzes/tests must also be taken with everyone else when you come back. ALL TESTS AND QUIZZES MUST BE MADE UP WITHIN 3 SCHOOL DAYS.

Indiana Academy Mask Policy

The Indiana Academy will follow Ball State University's mask policy (see Section IV). Based on current CDC guidance recommending the wearing of face masks for all people—regardless of vaccination status—in public indoor settings in communities where the rate of coronavirus transmission is high or substantial, all employees, students, and campus visitors are required to wear a mask while inside any University building. This requirement is effective on August 9, 2021. Fully vaccinated people are not required to wear masks outdoors.

Individuals who are not fully vaccinated for COVID-19 are required to wear face masks while inside campus buildings and outside when physical distancing cannot be maintained.

If a student declines to wear a face mask as required, the student will be referred to the Director of Academic Affairs or the Director of Residential Affairs. If the situation occurs in a classroom or other academic setting, it is considered a classroom management issue, and the teacher will remind the student of the requirement and give the student a chance to comply with it prior to referring the matter to the Director of Academic Affairs or the Director of Residential Affairs. Wearing masks is crucial to preventing the spread of COVID-19 to others.
